RABBI WHITMAN'S MESSAGE

Integrity and Humanity

Kol Nidre, the dramatic opening of Yom Kippur, the holiest day of the year, is curious in that it does not contain any themes relating to forgiveness or atonement, and is in fact not even a prayer, but a statement. How is this the most appropriate opening to this awesome day?

In fact, Kol Nidre is based on a short, obscure Torah passage in Parshat Mattot, regarding the annulment of vows. The Torah tells us we must keep our word. If we make a promise, it is a serious sin to break that promise. If the promise is to another person – to give or repay a loan, or to do a favor, there is no way out. Our promise commits us and we must fulfill it.

But if the promise is to myself – for example one promises him/herself to lose weight, to exercise, to attend Minyan more regularly – then, under certain circumstances that person can come before Bet Din (a Jewish Court), and plead that though they made the promise with the most noble of intentions, however circumstances have changed (a new injury prevents continuing exercise, waking up early has a negative effect on helping get the children ready for school, etc.) If the judges feel this pleading is valid, they may annul the vow.

Why is this important, and how is this connected to Yom Kippur? (The following ideas are partially based on an essay by Rabbi Tzvi Hersh Weinreb.)

Stephen Covey articulates the difference between honesty and integrity. Honesty is conforming our words to reality. Integrity is conforming reality to our words. Our goal is to lead not only lives of honesty, where our words conform to reality, but also lives of integrity, where our actions fulfill the words we have spoken. And when we commit ourselves to another, that commitment is absolute, and ignoring that commitment is a heinous sin.

But sometimes, at least in the promises we make to ourselves, we over-extend ourselves. In moments of crisis, or inspiration, we may promise commitments we cannot realistically fulfill. It is here that voluminous Torah law, based on this short, obscure passage in Parshat Mattot, provides a path for the annulment of vows. Bet Din has the capacity to recognize that for any one of us, situations change, priorities shift, and sometimes our human shortcomings cause us to mis-assess what we can accomplish.

Annulment of vows does not allow us to weasel out of our moral and legal obligations. But it does allow us, under certain limited circumstances, to remove the obligation of the promise, so that we can retain our integrity, so that we will not have allowed our words to go unfulfilled.



Kol Nidre is not about Yom Kippur. It is not even a prayer. It is a statement each of us makes, in the presence of the community, that any promises or oaths we will make during the coming year, which are subject to annulment, should be considered as wishes only, without the obligatory nature of a promise or an oath. By doing this, we seek to live lives of both honesty and integrity.

Yom Kippur is the holiest day of the year, the day we encounter God with an intimacy like no other day, a day of introspection, forgiveness, and atonement. Before Yom Kippur begins, we are given the opportunity to make a statement to God. What do we want to say to God before Yom Kippur begins? What is it imperative that God knows about us before this holy encounter?

God, please recognize we strive mightily to lead lives of honesty, and even lives of integrity. Our deepest desire is that we speak truth, and that we fulfill the words we say. But we are human, and sometimes we need help. Annul for us, *Kol Nidre*, all those promises that can legitimately be annulled, because we desperately want to lead lives of integrity. And forgive us for our words we did not fulfill. Because we are human. Because we are trying.

May God accept from you and me our heartfelt prayers, and grant us a Shana Tova, a New Year filled with good health, happiness, and spiritual growth.

PROGRAMMING REPORT

A Tale of Two Wolves

There is an old tale of a Cherokee elder, teaching his grandson about life. "A fight is going on inside me." he said to the boy. "It is a terrible fight and it is between two wolves. One is evil – he is fear, anger, envy, sorrow, regret, greed, arrogance, self-pity, guilt, resentment, inferiority, lies, false pride, superiority, and ego."

HIGH HOLIDAY INFORMATION

DECORUM - Prayer, to be meaningful, must be heartfelt, intensely emotional, and spiritual. All the themes of the High Holidays, and all our wishes for the coming year, are expressed through prayer. Above all, we must have the awareness, while praying, that we are speaking directly to God. God hears all prayers, in any language, as long as the prayer is heartfelt. To help achieve this goal, we respectfully request that you help enhance the dignity of our synagogue service by maintaining appropriate decorum. During services, married women are kindly requested to wear a head covering, and married men are requested to wear a Tallit. We provide these items in the lobby. Cell phones, beepers, and electronic games are not appropriate in the Sanctuary, unless needed for medical emergencies. We have a wonderful, creative children's group at which all children are welcome. Please ask the ushers for details.

SANCTUARY DOOR POLICY - In order to enhance the dignity of our services, please do not walk in or out of the sanctuary when the Rabbi is speaking, during Hineni, and during Kedushah. At these times, the main doors to the sanctuary will be closed. You can enter via the side entrance, through the Pearl Kiddush Room, but we ask that you take a seat, temporarily, just inside the door until the Rabbi finishes speaking. Please follow the directions of our ushers.

HOME BOUND SHOFAR BLOWING - If you or anyone you know cannot make it to services on Rosh Hashana and would like to hear Shofar, please inform Rabbi Whitman.

MACHZOR - The congregation uses the Birnbaum and the Artscroll High Holiday Machzor, but does not provide them. Please bring yours with you, with your name inside.

YIZKOR - The two Autumn Yizkor services are Yom Kippur, September 19, and Shmini Atzeret, October 1.

CHILDCARE - We offer a full and creative childcare program for the High Holidays. We have planned a full schedule of games and activities for each age group. 
